From our president....

It's all in how you see it, right? That is my theme this month, friends. If you are an organic farmer counting on the cash crop this summer and the well is failing and the crops are looking dry, you are sweating the weather that I crave. A farmer, hoping and praying for rain, scanning the sky for a hopeful cloud and to them the summer world looks a whole lot different. As a matter of fact, perception seems to be a description of how our minds process the world and it is variable from human to human. It is plenty steep on the side we traveled up and remarkably vertical on the other side as it drops away into the Snow Creek drainage. There was fierce bushwhacking, a bit of blood and some bruises before we found a lunch spot with an amazing view. We were above it all, looking down on Snow Creek Wall far below. Climbing higher we could see the Icicle Valley below and saw a flight of paragliders riding the wind. We walked on, higher up the ridge and the wind came. Suddenly there were 3 flyers riding the ridge lift just below us. Who's high now, what do you think? They ascended, spiraling into the lift, pulled upward by their powerful chutes and were above us in a moment. Aha, they are now supreme, eh?

What they did not see, and may never know, was that at that same time, which in that moment delighted us in a vision that will last for me forever, was a single magnificent bald eagle, master of the sky, riding the thermal in formation with them but 100 feet further above, shielded from their view by their nylon kites!

If I knew those flyers, if I could meet them and talk to them about what I saw, they would share my joy. Though they didn't 'see' it, they were part of it, and without them there would have been nothing miraculously extraordinary in my world that day.

We live in a world of pain and difficulty which also abounds with miracles. Find the miracles, people of Faith, see them, note them, share the good news! Blessings abound.

- 4. On-going care for one another in daily life, faith and sacramental worship.



Caring God, you enter our world with loving compassion. Teach us to do likewise. In Christ we pray.



Pastors Report

Pastor Eva continues to get to know the Faith Lutheran Church community through intentional visits, community events and gathering with members in a variety of ways. She attends Book Study and has begun plans for new member gatherings and also possible faith formation and confirmation classes. She has engaged in conversations about more intentional coordination between the website, newsletter and emails from the church. Pr. Eva has reached out to



the pastor of the United Methodist Church in town with the hope of developing a more intentional relationship with them as well as meet for weekly text study. Additionally, she plans to participate in a theological study group and book read with a group that Dane Breslin is hosting in Wenatchee. We have a very busy pastor!

Treasurer's Report

- \$60,000 was moved from our savings account into a 7-month CD offering 4.2% interest. \$70,000 remains in the savings account. It was passed unanimously to take out up to \$60,000 more and put into a higher interest CD.
- Our contributions this month were \$7,050 plus an annual gift of \$8,000. Total January-May, 2023 contributions were \$51,514.95 with the budgeted amount for this time period of \$65,000.
- The congregation should be reminded of the promise of increased giving made at the annual meeting.

Property Committee

- Roof on the Fellowship Hall is in the process of being replaced. Useable materials that have been removed are being saved for possible future use.
- Karl met with Mike Schramm, a retired building code professional, to revisit the status of the structural integrity of the parsonage. Investing in repairs, unless urgent, continues to be discouraged.

Worship Committee

- Services are planned through July 9
- Bulletins will be changed every 6 to 8 weeks during the season of Pentecost
- New hymns will be used out of All Creation Sings

Endowment Committee

- The committee met with a Thrivent representative and was reminded that all members have Choice Dollars to contribute to missions of the church as well as Action Team Dollars available up to \$250.
- We have two accounts with Thrivent. As of 6/2/2023 their values are \$46,010.40 and \$46,892.21 for a total value of \$92,902.61. This is up 5% since January, 2023. They also have money market accounts that pay between 4.3-4.5% interest.

As a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregation of the ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America), Faith Lutheran advocates for full welcome, inclusion and equity of LGBTQIA+ persons in all aspects of life together. June was Pride Month and there were a variety of ways local communities marked it. Of particular note, Pastor Dane Breslin, an openly queer minister, ordained in the Lutheran Church and serving

Additionally, our Northwest Intermountain Synod (NWIMS) unanimously approved a resolution to support the dignity, honor and rights of transgender humans at their synod assembly in April. The resolution came about largely in response to the legalized discrimination of trans folk in Idaho (part of our synod), and many other parts of our country. The resolution asks that we proclaim God's love for trans folk; declare our intention to love them unconditionally; encourage our congregations to welcome trans folk, affirm their humanity and dignity, and joyfully receive them into membership and into the mission we share; encourage congregations to pray publicly in Sunday worship for the well-being of trans folk; and encourage congregations to study and gain knowledge of challenges facing trans folk, enter into dialogue "with holy curiosity" regarding trans experience, and speak and act in ways that honor the lives of transgender people. The Endowment Committee met in April to review grant applications and to determine grant awards. Funds were awarded to all eleven requests. Because there was only \$4,400 in available funds, all but two applicants received less than their requested amount. Grants are distributed across four categories of need in accordance with our endowment resolution: 1) local or synod outreach 2) churchwide ministries 3) Faith Lutheran capital improvements or ministries 4) other non-profits.

Small grants were awarded to the following projects or organizations:

- **Men in the Mirror:** A Presbyterian ministry designed to reduce domestic violence in Central America and elsewhere. Started by our friend Brian Thompson-Royer.
- Dangerous Women: A local theater production that brings the forgotten or suppressed histories
 of remarkable women and feminine archetypes to life. The grant provided financial support for
 travel expenses for the 2023 production. Faith Lutheran women started this production and
 remain involved.
- Tumaini Boarding School (Tanzania): This school is a ministry of our Companion Synod, the Ulanga Kilombero Diocese. The school has experienced crop failures two years in a row due to drought. Donations help with the purchase of food or other critical needs.
- Lutherans Restoring Creation (LRC): LRC promotes care for creation through the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Faith Lutheran member Barbara Rossing serves on the advisory board of this organization.
- Immigration/Race Justice Group: This ministry of Faith Lutheran Church uses funds to help local immigrant families with financial challenges. For example, helping fund driver's education results in providing a family with transportation to work and school.
- Luceritos Non-Profit Organization: This organization was started by Faith Lutheran member Laurie Peek to support a nonprofit school in Guatemala that serves children from very poor families. Funds are used to purchase nutritious snacks for the kids.
- Ingalls Creek Community Outreach: This ministry of the Ingalls Creek Enrichment Center places a volunteer intern serving those with special needs in our community, including adult family homes and free clinics. The grant supports the costs of the intern.
- Staying Active and Independent for Life (SAIL): SAIL is an exercise program designed for senior citizens, which is offered at our church. The grant funded the purchase of small pieces of exercise equipment. Faith Lutheran member Connie Thomassen is an instructor. Our congregants benefit from this program.
- **Upper Valley Historical Museum:** The museum is providing field trips for 4th graders that will include speakers with Wenatchi/P'squosa ancestry. The grant will help fund travel expenses for these speakers.
- **FLC Quilters:** The grant request funded a roll of batting. The Faith Lutheran Church quilters have made over 30 quilts so far this year.
- Free Little Pantry: The grant will help fund the purchase of food supplies and other staple items for this ministry of Faith Lutheran Church. Groceries for the Free Little Pantry cost between \$350-\$500 per month.



IMMIGRATION/RACE JUSTICE GROUP June 28, 2023

With special guest: Pastor Eva Jensen

Finances: Our bank account and recent distributions were reviewed.

Book Study: Our next book study on the first 100 pages of *Caste* will be 6:30 pm on Wednesday, July 19 at LOGE. One of our members visited author Sarah Augustine (*This Land is Not Empty*) and had some conversation about a possible visit to Leavenworth in the timeframe August 7 – 12. Initial thoughts are to have two gatherings: a public one at the library and another with just the I/RJG and friends.

Recreation Ambassadors: I/RJG is set for Labor Day Weekend, Sat/Sun Sept. 2 & 3. Three folks attended the mandatory training, June 21. The rest will need to view the instructional video.

Citizenship Classes: Three students have filled out their citizenship applications and are awaiting an exam date. The fourth student is undergoing a divorce so will have to change his application.

A Citizenship Study Group will begin at the P-D library on Tuesdays 6-7 p.m., beginning July 11 Two of our members will help facilitate these informal sessions. Regular classes will begin again Oct. 10 US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS): Community Relations Officer (Tim) and the adjudicating officer from their Yakima office (Patrick) met with Norma Gallegos, Clara the librarian and Alex at the P-D library on Wednesday, June 21. The group discussed ways in which the broader library system might be used to encourage more adults to enroll in citizenship classes. This was the first in person meeting with USCIS in nearly 6 years!

Member updates:

- One member provided some hopefully good news from J.'s lawyer, on her and the two sons' asylum applications (now 10 years in process) based on a recent Supreme Court decision. May it be so!
- Another member commented on a former Cascade H.S. student whom I/RJG helped who came
 to visit thanking her for the assistance she and her family received which changed their lives.
 Another one of her students is currently at Western State University this week attending their
 Summer Biology Camp. We helped "replace" the \$1,000 in lost wages thus enabling him to
 attend.
- Another member spoke of how Camp Camrec (https://www.camrec.org) has been contracting and engaging with local Hispanic workers who have shown interest in attending the first Sunday of the month dinners. In addition, some will be sending some of their children to summer camp. Outstanding outreach work not experienced in the camp's history!
- One of our members received a phone call from E. (Moses Lake) whom we assisted with \$400 in April of 2022. He was initially referred to us by WA Immigration Solidarity Network (WAISN). Due to his ongoing disability and his wife's decreased work hours, he again is seeking assistance for food and bills. Labor and Industry had denied his disability request. The group decided to send him \$500 as well as give him the phone numbers of the Ritzville food bank and a farmer in Warden who might be able to offer him employment. May it be so!

<u>Advocacy</u>: Due to schedules and other responsibilities, none of the I/RJG were able to virtually attend the Faith Action Network spring regional meeting in early June.

<u>Mutual Support:</u> The group welcomed Pastor Eva to the meeting and shared personal stories.
