There will be a sump pump installed under the Fellowship hall to direct the snowmelt out of the crawlspace as it gets wet every Spring. The old roof is going, the new roof is coming! Though we don't have an exact date, we are on the schedule to have the Fellowship Hall re-roofed with metal. It is not leaking yet, which is the best time to replace a roof. Plans are being fleshed out to remove the old playground fence and grade the area behind the church for additional parking. The parsonage garage needs new doors built and installed. Much to do and much to celebrate. I am Thankful for our Church and church family.

FAITH LUTHERAN CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING 2023

January 29



- Pr. Barbara Rossing started the meeting with prayer.
- President Karl Kranz announced that Eva Jensen has accepted the call to be our Pastor and will begin April 1, 2023.
- Connie Thomassen will be going off the church council. Karl Kranz was up for re-election and was unanimously elected for another term. Members Greg Steeber, Greg Harris, Janice Monroe, Pete Spiegel, Eric Krumland and Rosalyn Francis remain on the council.
- Greg Steeber and Lauren Johnson were unanimously elected to be voting members to the Synod Assembly in April.
- The Nominating Committee, John Schramm, Barbara Rossing and Margaret Neighbors was unanimously re-elected.
- The Call Committee was recognized for a job well done. Members of the Call Committee were Danny Thomassen, Amy Carlson, Heidi Krumland, Mike Camp, Mary Steeber and Lori Reister.
- There was a brief discussion about the use of the parsonage. Karl Kranz asked that we give this further thought and discuss at a separate meeting.
- Treasurer Greg Steeber reported that in spite of not receiving the typical increase in financial contributions at the end of the year, our finances were stable. This is primarily due to a large, anonymous gift of \$30,000. He presented a variety of charts that illustrated giving patterns over time; reported that 25% of giving is now done electronically and of particular note, in 2019 we had 96 giving units and in 2022, we had 49 giving units. He then presented a proposed budget that will require a 15% increase in giving over the next year compared to 2022, primarily due to the decrease in giving in 2022 and the high cost of housing for our new pastor. The proposed budget was approved unanimously.
- Pr. Barbara Rossing closed the meeting with a prayer.

Elections The following persons were elected to another two-year term: Karl Kranz – President, Rosalyn Francis – Vice President, Jan Monroe – Secretary, Greg Steeber – Treasurer

Treasurer's Report

- Although the Endowment Fund is up \$1000, it is still lower than last year due to the market.
- Contributions were very low in January.
- We will be making changes to how we pay our benevolences. ELCA, World Hunger/ELCA, Lutheran World Relief will be paid on a quarterly basis. MEND will be paid twice a year and Council Designated Giving, Faith Action Network (LPPO), Grunewald Guild and Holden Village once a year.
- Deanne Erickson was paid for her help with creating the church directory.
- The property tax form for the exemption on the parsonage needs to be completed by March 31.

Property Committee Snow shoveling continues. The hand railing on the west side of the Fellowship Hall was destroyed by falling snow and will need to be rebuilt this spring. Other projects include installing a sump pump, creating French drains on the west side of the building, repairing the small shed, removing the playground equipment to make way for parking spaces and installing a garage door for the parsonage garage.

Worship Committee will meet on Tuesday, 2/28 with Eva joining via zoom.

Endowment Committee Applications for endowment grants are being accepted through March 31. Applications forms will be mailed to the congregation.

Other business

- Greg Steeber is looking into what needs to be done to keep facebook, the website and the delivery of virtual worship more consistently up to date.
- Pr. Barbara Rossing has encouraged everyone to read the *Living Lutheran* magazine. The church will pay the subscription fee for anyone who would like it.
- Pr. Dave Haven will be contacted soon to begin plans for a service of installation for Eva Jensen.
- Newsletter delivery to nwi email addresses continues to be problematic. Some people have changed their email addresses. Danny Thomassen has offered to pay for the printing and mailing of the newsletter to people who can't get it by email.
- The rental of the parsonage was discussed. There are at least two parties interested. Lease arrangements and monthly rate were decided.
- Rosalyn would like to do a fundraiser at church. Any ideas?
- Creating a weekly worship bulletin was discussed and tabled for next month.
- Occasionally we get requests for the use of our tables and chairs. It seems prudent to create some kind of guidelines / protocols for these inquires. Karl will write a draft for discussion.

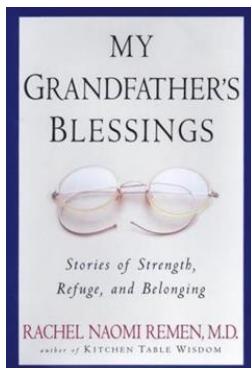
The endowment resolution established by our congregation is followed closely. Grants are distributed in the following percentages.

1. Minimum of 20% for outreach into the local community or synod.
2. Minimum of 20% for Churchwide ministries.
3. Minimum of 20% for extraordinary programs/capital improvements or other ministry initiatives within this congregation.
4. Minimum 10% for other non-profit humanitarian organizations.
5. Remaining 30% distributed through any of the above categories.

Last year grants were awarded to the following programs/projects: Immigration/Race Justice Group, Dangerous Women, Cascade School District Drama Program, Cascade PTO screening the movie "Screenagers", Cascade Kodiak art supplies, Lutherans Restoring Creation, C.E.I.P.A.: Luceritos, Tumaini Boarding School, Men in the Mirror and the Ingalls Creek Enrichment Center.

IMMIGRATION/RACE JUSTICE GROUP February 22, 2023

- **Finances:** Advent Lutheran, Spokane Valley, granted our request for \$700 with an endowment gift of \$1,103! Plus, we received \$200 in cash from our Benevolent Night at München Haus and will soon receive an additional amount from 25% of the sales that evening.
- **Flyer:** The flyer that was prepared was well received at the MH fundraiser. Suggestions were made for the upcoming revised version.
- **Book Study:** We have begun reading *The LAND is NOT EMPTY: Following Jesus in Dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery*. The study group will meet once to discuss the book. Date to be determined. It was suggested that we invite the author, Sarah Augustine, to speak at the library for a community educational event.
- **Time Magazine:** We reviewed two articles from the last two TIME issues: Ibram X. Kendi's *Changing How We Think About Racism* reviewing his new book geared for youth and Isabel Wilkerson's *Our Enduring Discontents: How to Understand America* a selection from her award winning book of the same name.
- **Direct Support:** The possibility that there may be students in need of financial help to register for Driver's Education is being looked into.
- **AVID Update:** I/RJG participants reflected on their two class sessions helping students to fill out applications for financial aid. All said it was valuable time spent and will do it again.
- **Citizenship and ESL Classes:** Two students continue with Citizenship Classes at the Peshastin Library. There is rumor that the application will soon be changed as well as an increased cost.
- **Assisted Families:** One of our members reported that a family we have assisted was able to access State funds for COVID assistance. Discussion was held on the value of having a current list of families that have been assisted to keep from overlooking opportunities.
- **Advocacy:** A member mentioned an upcoming training she will be involved with for a self-assessment inventory on cross-cultural competency. Perhaps taken by our group?
- Continue being attentive to local, national and world news and see how you might help support these vital NGOs and advocates for justice.

Medical care assistance...

Upper Valley MEND's free clinic program (Upper Valley Free Clinic) received some funding through the Washington State Health Care Authority (HCA)—approximately \$300,000—to support individuals in the Upper Valley who are uninsured or underinsured and whose income is at or below 200% of the federal poverty level, regardless of immigration status. This is individual income rather than family income so a 26 year old making \$27,180 a year or less, though living at home with other family members earning well above the poverty level, would be eligible.

Do you know anyone needing help with medical care costs?

This grant covers payment of past medical bills, current prescription costs, dental work up to \$10,000 and vision care for eligible individuals including exam and cost of spectacle lenses and frames. It also pays the salary for MEND's social worker, Liz Hurtado. Funds need to be spent by June of 2024 or they will be returned to HCA. If you know of folks who might be eligible, encourage them to call Liz at MEND-509 293-8062 and she will do an evaluation to check their eligibility for this grant. It is intended for people living or working from Cashmere to Stevens and Blewett Passes, though we are reviewing individuals from down valley as well. Questions?
