

Pastor's Report

- Don Haven and Cindy Carroll continue to guide us through our *Faith Moving Forward* Campaign toward the purchase of a pasonage.
- Our Lenten theme is 'Holy Lament'. Eric Krumland is helping to craft the Wednesday night services of reflection and music. Wednesday night soup suppers will be organized by Rosalyn & Connie. The first midweek service will be in the parish hall after soup.
- Susan Butruille injured her hand and will not be able to play piano through Easter Sunday, at least. Replacement plans are underway.
- There has been a number of forums after Sunday morning coffee hour including a talk by Savanna Sullivan (Lutheran World Federation) on COP28, a talk by Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb (Lutheran pastor in Jerusalem) on the war in Gaza and a Faith Moving Forward rally. Forums on Funeral & End-of-Life Planning are being planned.
- Pr. Eva continues to meet with members of the Faith community and seek conversation with those possibly interested in joining.
- Deanne Erickson continues to work her magic with keeping congregants informed and connected via Emails, bulletins and bulletin inserts.
- Hope to create a brochure of Small Groups & Committees at Faith.

Treasurer's Appointment and Report:

- The council voted to appoint Greg Steeber as a council member to fill the vacant position.
- Monthly contributions are below budget but with reserves, bank balances are stable even with the withdrawl of \$110,000 for down payment on the new parsonage.
- Benevolences are being paid quarterly and some annually (not monthly)
- Our Forward in Faith campaign is moving forward with good energy.

Property Committee

- Vent pipes are still vertical, a sump pump in the crawl space and a new water heater are needed.
- The Tumwater Dr house will need some maintenance.
- HP office printer continues to have problems

Tumwater Parsonage Project Committee

- Provisional approval has been received from Mission Investments regarding our mortgage application.
- A purchase agreement was signed (\$575,000), earnest money delivered, closing is April 1.

Grant applications are now being accepted by the Faith Lutheran Endowment Committee through March 31, 2024. This year there is \$5,100 available for distribution which is up \$700 from last year! Still, the amount available is relatively small so consider this in your request.

The endowment committee carefully follows the endowment resolution established by our congregation. The grants are to be distributed in the following percentages:

- Minimum of 20% for outreach into the local community or synod
- Minimum of 20% for Churchwide ministries
- Minimum of 20% for extraordinary programs/capital improvements or other ministry initiatives within this congregation
- Minimum 10% for other non-profit humanitarian organizations
- Remaining 30% distributed through any of the above categories

The application will be sent to Faith Lutheran community via email or you can request an application from Lisa Therrell at merrymulesears@msn.com or committee members Debbie Florea, Jan Monroe and Pastor Eva Jensen. Please contact any of us if you have questions.

Last year grants were awarded to the following programs/projects: Immigration/Race Justice Group, Dangerous Women, Lutherans Restoring Creation, C.E.I.P.A.: Luceritos, Tumaini Boarding School, Men in the Mirror, the Free Little Pantry, SAIL, FLC Quilters, and the Ingalls Creek Enrichment Center.



Two Grants Received from Advent Lutheran Endowment

Advent Lutheran Church is located in Spokane Valley. The church has an endowment of which their bylaws allow them to share portions with other ministries throughout our synod. The endowment just provided

\$450 for Faith Lutheran's Free Little Pantry for the purchase of food and other essentials. The endowment provided an additional \$450 to the Immigration/Race Justice Group, who has already used the funding to help five families partially fund driver's education classes for teenagers. Once a teenager has their license, they are able to help provide adequate transportation for their families to work, school and so on. Driver's Education now costs \$550 per student.

According to Pastor Matt Larson, Advent Lutheran had more grant applications than ever. Most requests were funded less than the requested amount.

The History Corner by Danny Thomassen

Who was Martin Luther anyway? As a man from the 16th Century living over 500 years ago what impact, if any, could he have on us living in the 21st Century? The general media today celebrate him as "The Reformer"; a man who changed the world, the "fallen Catholic" who disrupted the sanctity of the papacy in Rome. Did he really? During his times the Catholics had labeled him a "protestant" or what we would call today a "protester" with a sign on the streets of a modern downtown city.

On 31.October.1517 Martin nailed "his sign" (95 Thesis) to the wooden door of the Castle Church (community bulletin board) in downtown Wittenberg, Germany. He expected an intellectual gentleman's debate on several issues. He was protesting Rome's sale of indulgences to the German population who were already on the margins of financial survival. Luther knew that Pope Leo X was building St. Peter's Bacilica in Rome and needed an enormous influx of liquid capital to support his construction project. The coffers of the Vatican were going to be negatively affected by this "protest". The reaction from the papacy would involve much more than a simple debate for this virtually unknown Catholic priest living in Wittenburg.

Superstition during the 16th Century was ramped-up to the level where the average citizens harbored exaggerated fear of mortal death and possible eternal damnation based on their "works on Earth". The Roman Catholic Church papacy offered a "get out of jail free" card; for a few taler (dollar) in the till you could receive a document from the Pope guaranteeing eternal salvation. For a few extra taler you could even release your dead loved ones who were



suffering in purgatory. This was the in-group's strategic advantage over the out-group (The Germans).

Today we see protests on our city streets all the time. There is usually an in-group and an outgroup. We scoff at the out-group hurdling verbal insults and can even witness moderate violence and destruction of private property. As human beings wrapped up in our daily lives, we sometimes fail to focus our perspectives on the intentions of the out-group and begin to set our boundaries, limit our circles, and possibly ignore the misfortune and suffering of others. The homeless tent camps along our freeways, highways and in our large cities are an overt form of public protests. It can become easy to distance ourselves or even ignore complex life situations, denying others (i.e. out-group) a sense of agency in our society. We could consider Martin as one of the pioneer "protesters" as Europe was gravitating towards a more modern era of Enlightenment.



On February 25, Faith Lutheran celebrated Abundance Sunday where community members had the opportunity to offter their pledges of support for the *Faith Moving Forward* Campaign during worship. The service was followed by a festive luau to celebrate the gifts received. See photos at the end of this newsletter.

The pledges received so far truly demonstrate abundant generosity and confidence in our mission. There are a number of people who have indicated they would like to participate in the campaign but were not able to be present for Abundance Sunday or live at a distance and have not had the opportunity to get their pledges in the mail so it is too early to announce a final dollar amount. Early numbers indicate we will far surpass our goal of \$250K which is shear blessing as it further reduces the size of mortgage needed to purchase the parsonage.

We want you to know how grateful we are to have been invited to walk alongside the people of Faith during the past few months as they raised money to provide affordable housing for pastoral leadership. We have been impressed with the willingness, creativity and the wonderful generosity of this congregation. You and your leaders created a vision of acquiring affordable housing for your current and future pastors. You have dedicated 10% of the funds raised in the campaign to help support MEND in its mission to develop an empowered community with equitable access to food, housing, wellness, and economic security. There's a possibility of creating an outdoor worship space next to the Fellowship Hall. Your participation in and through the teams that were formed during the campaign have brought a sense of teamwork and unity that will serve as a foundation for future ministry at Faith. In all of this, as the Apostle Paul wrote to the Corinthian congregation, "You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity which will produce thanksgiving to God..."

There are many people to thank but we want to say a special thank you to Karl Kranz. His enthusiasm and his willingness to serve, not only as your congregation's president, but also as the Chair of the Capital Campaign, has been a great gift to Faith Lutheran!

The success of the campaign goes far beyond the funds raised for this project. It illustrates how the generous people of Faith Lutheran continue to live into the mission to which you've been called by a loving, abundant and gracious Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer in all of life.

Area People of Faith Advocate in Olympia


Susan Butruille was one of nearly 200 people of faith who gathered at the Capitol in Olympia on February 8 during the 2024 short legislative session to advocate for issues from the legislative agenda of FAN, Faith Action Network (fanwa.org), that promote service, justice and equality for the people of Washington. Susan joined 10 other constituents of Legislative District 12, mostly from Wenatchee, to hear plenary speakers, attend workshops and meet with legislators and staff. The Wenatchee/Leavenworth contingent met with Representatives Keith Goehner and Mike Steele and staff of Senator Brad Hawkins.

Among the top issues for advocates were



affordable housing, environmental issues and health equity. Our own Mayor Carl Florea testified in Olympia a week later in support of affordable housing and other issues.

Canadian Author and Adventurer to Speak at FLC



Author and adventurer Merle Kindred will give an illustrated presentation on her book, Gripped by Guyana: A Memoir of Purpose and Adventure, at Faith Lutheran on Tuesday, March 19 at 7:00 in the Fellowship Hall. Kindred, who lives in Penticton, B.C., volunteered with Cuso, the Canadian counterpart to the Peace Corps, for two six-month assignments in Guyana, on the northeast coast of South America, in 2017-18. In both urban and rural settings, the "senior volunteer" worked in development with the people of Guyana in agriculture, ecotourism and technology. Along with her development work, Kindred immersed herself in Guyanese culture, music, food, and nature -- especially birds, illustrating highlights in embroidery on the vest she still wears. I have been reading instructor Grace Pomroy's Stewardship Leaders Newsletter for at least five years. I know the word stewardship does not excite everyone as much as it does me, so let me state clearly that there has always been something unique about Pomroy's approach to generosity and stewardship. It is holistic, includes both data and stories, creative (but not trendy), and it is always grounded in scripture and prayer. Last summer, when I read the draft of her forthcoming book, I loved the way she started with the Ezra 3:10-13 passage and also began each chapter with Dwelling in the Word (similar to Lectio Divina). Over the years, I learned that Pomroy's seminary students do case studies on the various ways churches are finding or creating funding streams beyond the Sunday offering. So, when she said she was available to present at our three regional gatherings this spring, I was elated.

The regional gatherings are something I have been excited about since the idea first arose. I wonder sometimes if people think we wrote the resolution because we disliked synod assemblies. Nothing could be further from the truth. I love synod assemblies! I also love long retreats and full weeks at our outdoor ministry sites. I love the ELCA Youth Gathering. I am a product of so many of our Lutheran gathering events and spaces. My faith in the Triune God has been nourished, my soul has been fed, my conscience prodded, my sense of belonging and belovedness nurtured and my imagination opened by gathering with other Christians.

Who is ready to be inspired by Grace Pomroy, who cares deeply about congregational life and grounds her work in rich scriptural interpretation and wonderful questions?
