<u>Presentation</u> by Pr. Don Haven representing Abundant Congregations regarding Capital Fund raising campaign

Treasurer's Report:

- Bank balances are stable. There was a decrease from budget in March giving, but net positive income this month due to flat expenses. The picture will change in April as we compensate our pastor.
- Cash donations are now a very minor part of giving.
- \$4400 have been assigned for the Endowments this year.
- Parsonage Property tax is now due as no longer tax exempt.

Property Committee

- Mowing and maintenance through the Fonseca's to continue. No date on re-roofing yet from the contractor.
- Back Porch railing has been repaired, still needs painting.
- Playground equipment has been consolidated, conversation with Judy Derpack and Lindsay initiated about donation of the playhouse and other items.

Worship Committee:

- New input from Pr Eva appreciated.
- Planning for the installation this Sunday reviewed. Hospitality Committee has food arrangements in hand.
- An online subscription to *Sundays and Seasons* is being considered.

Endowment Committee: \$4400 to Endowment committee for dispersal this year.

<u>Call Committee</u>: Will remain together for Pr Eva's first 6 months and then transition to a Pastor Support Group.

Parsonage Project Committee

- Excavators are available when needed per Rayfields for structure takedown and site prep.
- Planning for presentation of the parsonage project to congregation is in process. This will be informational, a discussion without a vote regarding lot division, house plans, timing of project.
- Fund raising reviewed, no date set yet for the start of a fundraising campaign.

Old Business

- Parsonage rental: Karl is working on securing a renter.
- The policy for borrowing of chairs/tables was unanimously approved.
- New Parsonage planning is ongoing
- Consideration of a weekly bulletin was tabled until next meeting.
- Update on playground/preschool equipment- awaiting a recipient
- A new laser color printer has been purchased and installed in the church office. The old printer installed at Pr Eva's home.

IMMIGRATION/RACE JUSTICE GROUP April 19, 2023

Finances: \$250 was paid to a Cascade School District student to assist with registration for Driver's Education. No word yet on the Faith Lutheran endowment application.

WAISIN: Our membership with Washington Immigration Solidarity Network in the "Partnership" level has been resubmitted. No response as of yet.

Book Study: We continue reading *The LAND is NOT EMPTY: Following Jesus in Dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery.* Our study date will be **Wednesday, May 10** details TBA. Efforts continue to follow up on the possibility that Sarah Augustine (the author) could speak here in Leavenworth or perhaps in conjunction with Wenatchee's Immigrant Justice Group

Recreation Ambassador: We continue to consult with the Chamber to finalize getting dates for their Recreation Ambassador program this summer.

Direct Support:

- Our Cascade School District staff member mentioned three students who have various needs ranging from Driver's Ed registration (\$500) to wage replacement of \$1,000 lost wages during an upcoming weeklong conference at Western State University to good used laptop computers needed for college prep and enrollment. A member's family has begun a fundraiser for one student while additional resources are being checked for assisting the others in these requests. Depending on the outcomes, we may assist as needed. The need for quality used computers will be posted on our website and the two other social media platforms with which we are involved.
- Distribution List: This spreadsheet presented a partial list of those families and individuals that we have supported in the past. The list seemed appropriate and needful for our purposes.
 NOTE: If you have engaged with a family/student who has received assistance from us, please submit their name to Alex along with a brief description, amount given, and relevant dates if possible.
- **Citizenship and ESL Classes:** Four students have filled out their citizenship applications and have submitted them to Norma Gallegos at Wenatchee's *Hand In Hand* for her to finalize and type out as their official representative.
- We will keep checking with Liz Hurtado at MEND about any families that they aren't able to sufficiently help.

Advocacy: Members present spoke of their advocacy efforts and experiences for immigrant students/families within their own work settings.

Mutual Support: Significant time was given for intimate and personal conversations on how those present are faring in their life's journey.

The new **ELCA Climate Message** was adopted by the Church Council on April 26, 2023. The Rev. Dr. Jim Martin-Schramm, son-in-law of John and Mary Schramm, and the Rev. The Farm Bill: The United States Congress is preparing to reauthorize the Farm Bill later this year. Each reauthorization provides an opportunity to improve or expand programs that ensure access to fresh and healthy food while addressing root causes of hunger. With deep commitment to a just world where all are fed, the ELCA has been gathering faith-centered perspectives from Lutherans around the country to inform it's advocacy to impact reauthorization decisions on Capitol Hill. During the month of April, three virtual listening sessions took place. Each session focused on a particular geographic region – Eastern and Central, Pacific and Mountain – addressing the respective concerns and challenges that will inform their advocacy efforts.
